The Macdonald Collection of Japanese and Japanese-Inspired Ceramics

The Macdonald Collection brings together over 300 objects made in Japan, China, and Europe in the 1600s and 1700s and donated to the Gardiner Museum by William and the late Molly Anne Macdonald. The Macdonalds' collecting journey was first sparked by an admiration for the imperfect beauty of early Japanese porcelain often characterized by a taste for asymmetry, spontaneous decoration, or uneven shapes. What they called an "adventure in search of imperfection" led to the formation of a unique collection that documents porcelain production in the town of Arita, Japan, while highlighting the role of ceramics in fostering global connections. At the heart of their vision was a desire to demonstrate how Japanese porcelain in the Kakiemon style — with its bright enamels and asymmetrical designs — functioned as both a vehicle for the exchange of ideas and a source of inspiration for makers in other parts of the world.

For the first time, the Macdonald Collection is on view in its entirety throughout the Museum. Spanning the three levels of the Museum's stairwell, the Courtois Gallery features a special display that invites you to discover Japanese porcelain from the early Edo period (1603–1868) and Japanese-inspired ceramics through the themes of nature, leisure, and global trade. Continue your visit in the Macdonald Gallery on the second floor to delve deeper into some of these histories.

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Basement

Symbolic Nature

Nature was a predominant source of inspiration across the arts of the early Edo period (1603-1868). Images of birds with auspicious meanings take flight on this group of objects. Among them, the quail symbolized peace and harmony, while the egret stood for grace and beauty. Figures of animals associated with the twelve signs of the zodiac — such as the dog and rooster — were displayed in homes to welcome the New Year. In the late 1600s, these figurines were also exported to Europe alongside other Kakiemon-style porcelain on which animal and mythical creatures coexist. The dragon and tiger were a frequent pair, symbolizing Heaven and Earth respectively. In addition, the tiger often shared space with the bamboo plant, representing moral integrity. The phoenix, a colourful, imaginary bird with long tail-feathers, signified political authority. The meanings of these motifs were lost on European viewers and the artists who appropriated them onto ceramics.



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Second Floor

Porcelain at Home

Most of the objects assembled here were used by Japanese consumers during the early Edo period (1603–1868), an era characterized by political stability and economic growth. This context encouraged leisure activities and the demand for fashionable ceramics. For instance, the kaiseki, the multi-course meal that followed the ritual of the tea ceremony, was presented using a variety of smallsize dishes together on a tray. The smaller plates decorated in blue and white (sometsuke) and the brightly coloured Ko-Kutani wares likely served this function. Incense burning, known as the "way of incense," was another popular pastime that called for refined utensils. The appreciation of nature and gardens finds expression through the vast range of floral motifs encountered on the objects, as well as vases used in the creation of seasonal displays of flowers.





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Third Floor

Trade and the Craze for Kakiemon

Kakiemon-style porcelain was made in Arita, Japan, from the 1670s to the 1690s. This type of ceramic is characterized by a creamy-white porcelain body, sparse and asymmetrical decoration, and a bright palette of coloured enamels, including a rich orange inspired by the colour of persimmons (kaki in Japanese). Made primarily for export, Kakiemon wares reached Southeast Asia, the Middle East, and Europe alongside other luxury commodities traded by the Dutch East India Company and Chinese merchants. In Europe, the style caused a sensation. In the 1700s, consumer demand prompted makers to imitate and transform its shapes and decorative language dominated by flora, animals, and mythical creatures. Primarily made in Europe for dining and the consumption of hot drinks, the objects on display reflect the fashion and craze for Kakiemon.
